What is Poetry?

Poetry is a collection of words that express an emotion or idea, sometimes with a specific meaning, sound, or rhythm.



What Can Poetry Help Us Do?

- *Helps us build connections
- *Helps us experiment with words
- *Helps us express feelings
- *Helps us use all our senses
- *Helps us get inspiration
- *Helps us build fluency



Poet's Purpose


What Do Poets Do?

- *Share feelings (joy, anger, sadness, fear, wonder)
- *Tell a story
- *Send a message
(something to think about)
- *Be humorous
- *Provide description
(person, thing)



Poetry also uses many poetic devices, or figurative language.

These include similes, metaphors, onomatopoeia, alliteration, repetition, and personification, and lots of imagery!




What Do We Know About Poetry?

- *There are many different kinds of poems.







ACROSTIC

In Acrostic poems, the first letters of each line are aligned vertically to form a word.

The word often is the subject of the poem



List:

A list poem is a poem that is basically a list about a certain topic.



COLOR:

A poem about your favorite color.
Express your feelings about a
single color with analogies or
similes or list nouns which
are that color.

Another easy form is to use the 5
senses-looks like, sounds like,
smells like, tastes like, feels like.

Color sounds like
Color smells like
Color tastes like
Color feels like



Rhythm:

A rhythm poem is one in which the words create a pattern of stressed and unstressed syllables. There are often repeated phrases.



CINQUAIN:

Cinquains have five lines

Line 1: Title (noun) - 1 word

Line 2: Description - 2 words

Line 3: Action - 3 words

Line 4: Feeling - 4 words

Line 5: Title (synonym for the title) - 1 word



I WISH POEMS -

Each line of the poem begins with the words "I wish" and then you fill in your ideas.

The poem should be 8-10 lines long.



HAIKU:

Haiku is Japanese poetry that reflects on nature and feelings. You use your observation skills to write what you see in a new or different way.

There are three lines with five syllables in the first line, seven syllables in the second, and five syllables in the third.



RHYMING:

Couplets are made up of two lines whose last words rhyme. They are often silly.

Triplets are made up of three lines. The rhyming pattern can be AAA or ABA.

Quatrains are made up of four lines. The rhyming pattern can be AABB or ABAB.



SHAPE or CONCRETE:

Shape poems are made up of words that have been placed in such a way that they make the shape of an object and also use words to describe the object.



Limerick:

A limerick is a poem that is often silly or whimsical, written in five lines with an AABBA rhyme scheme.

Often, limericks tell a short, humorous story



Diamante:

A diamante is an unrhymed seven-line poem that forms the shape of a diamond.

Diamantes are seven lines long.
The first and last lines have just one word.

The second and sixth lines have two words.

The third and fifth lines have three words.

And the fourth line has four words.

Lines 1, 4, and 7 have nouns.


Lines 2 and 6 have adjectives.

Lines 3 and 5 have verbs.

Sleeping Bag template-


Trace on colored paper, cut out.







Some of the best poems grab the reader, and spark the imagination. One way to grab attention is to use the five senses.

This short lesson will give you an example of how you can use this technique in your own poetry!

Planning Your Poem

First, you will need a topic. This could be a time of year, a special day, a period in history, a favorite place, a scary place... any time or place that inspires you! These can be real times or places from your life, or they could be things you've learnt about in History, Geography, or on TV.

Next, build some lines, so write out 5 sentence headings – 'I See', 'I Hear', 'I Smell', 'I Touch' and 'I Taste' Imagine all the different things you might see, hear, smell, taste or touch in your chosen time or place, and write at least one noun by each heading.

For example, if I choose 'Spring' as my topic, I could write:

I See... blue skies
I Hear... baby birds
I Smell... flower buds
I Touch... new leaves
I Taste... easter eggs

OPTIONAL ADDITIONS!

Now you can add the next part to each line:

'The sight is...'

'The sound is...'

'The smell is...'

'The feeling is...'

'The taste is...'

Add a word to complete your 5 lines!

I See... blue skies.

The sight is... beautiful

I Hear... baby birds.

The sound is... chirping

I Smell... flower buds blooming.

The smell is... fresh

I Touch... new leaves.

The feeling is... soft

I Taste... easter eggs.

The taste is... chocolatey

When writing poetry, use a 6th sense – emotion.

So finally, add one more heading –

'I Feel'. Is it a good feeling, or a bad one?
