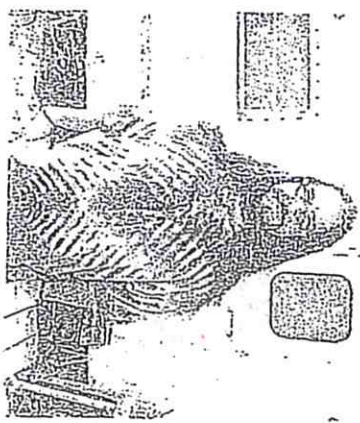
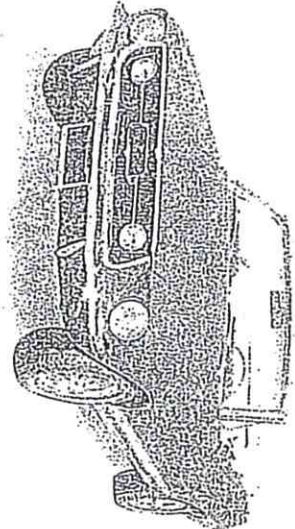
What made the scene 45 years ago

It was 1964, and the times, they sure were a-changin'. In this pivotal year in history, the U.S. Congress authorized war in Vietnam and passed the landmark Civil Rights Act of 1964. That year of the British Invasion, the Rolling Stones released their first album, and The Beatles made their first appearance on *The Ed Sullivan Show*.

Fashion responded to the war with the hippie look of bell-bottoms and tie-dye shirts, and to the newest musical sounds with the mod look, marled by miniskirts and go-go boots.

Here in Detroit, William Clay Ford purchased the Lions for \$4.5 million - which might or might not have been a bargain. The first Ford Mustang rolled off the assembly line, and The Supremes took the Motown label to No. 1 with *Where Did Our Love Go*.

- Medallion-print culotte in smooth percale from Sears: \$3.84
- Ye Ye bikini with nylon mesh bra from Montgomery Ward: \$16.97
- * Children's car seat: \$5.95
- * 1/2 gallon of ice cream: 79 cents
- * Loaf of bread: 20 cents
- * 1 dozen eggs: 54 cents
- * 1 pound of coffee: 82 cents
- * 10-pound bag of potatoes: 76 cents
- * Gallon of gas: 30 cents
- * U.S. postage stamp: 5 cents
