#2- Exotic Pet Act

- 1 Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2 **Section I:** All exotic pets are banned in the United States.
- 3 Section II: An exotic pet is defined as any animal kept for personal reasons in a private
- 4 residence that is not generally considered to be domesticated, or that is considered to be
- 5 foreign. Exotic pets include, but are not limited to, tigers, other large cats, monkeys, elephants,
- 6 pythons, and alligators.
- 7 Section III: Funding for this bill will be provided by a special 2% tax added to pet food.
- 8 Section IV: This ban will be enforced by members of the state police. Offenders will be
- 9 required to give their exotic pets up to a suitable zoo or shelter for exotics. Offenders will also
- be fined up to \$5,000 for exotic they own. If the exotic severely injures anyone, is abused or
- 11 mistreated, or is an endangered species, fines can be raised up to \$500,000 and the offender
- can be sentenced to up to five years in jail. This bill will be implemented on December 1, 2015,
- to give current exotic pet owners time to find suitable new homes for their exotics.

#3- A Bill to Encourage the Sale of Electric Vehicles

Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:

- 1. Section 1: The purchase of all electric vehicles including hybrids shall be subsidized by a

Be it enacted by the congress here assembled that:

- 1. Section I: All students in Michigan public schools will be required to take a current government
- 2. policy class in their senior year.
- 3. Section II: The current government policy class will be a semester long, and count as a history
- 4. credit. This class will consist of discussion of new government policies, such as what bills are
- 5. being debated, what bills have passed, and what bills have failed. A unit consisting of proper
- 6. researching and reasoning techniques when deciding who to vote for must be included. The
- 7. duration of this unit is up to the individual school. A final exam consisting of questions about
- 8. current government decisions must be given. This class is needed in order to graduate. Any

#9- Immigration Reform Act of 2014

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section 1: All illegal immigrants who have been living in the United States prior to
- 3. January 1, 2015 will be pardoned. After this date, the U.S. Custom Border Patrol will
- 4. enforce 100% of the United States' perimeter.
- 5. Section 2: Illegal immigrants shall be defined as foreigners who enter or reside in

- 13. additional 10% of U.S. border that is unpatrolled. Secondly, any illicit practices
- 14. performed by the immigrant, including prostitution, distributing of illegal drugs, and or
- 15. gambling, will have punishment determined by the state the immigrant resides in. All
- 16. necessary funding will be provided by a 2% tax increase on tobacco products.
- 17. Section 5: All laws or portions of laws in conflict with the provisions of this legislation
- 18. shall hereby be declared null and void.

#10- A Bill to Allow the Sanctioned Cloning of Critically Endangered Animals

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: Sanctioned cloning of critically endangered animals shall hereby be allowed.
- 3. Section II: Organizations to officially clone critically endangered animals shall be authorized by the
- 4. United States Department of the Interior (DOI). Animals shall be determined to be critically
- 5. endangered by the international organization World Wildlife Fund for Nature (WWF). The number of a
- 6. species that shall be cloned shall be under the supervision of the Department of the Interior. Cloning of
- 7. all animals that are not deemed critically endangered is hereby prohibited. Cloning of critically
- 8. endangered species is allowed until the species' population is deemed stable by WWF. The sale and/or
- 9. trade of cloned animals is hereby prohibited. Any cloned species that is not indigenous to the United
- 10. States of America and survives for a period one (1) year shall be returned to its native land for
- 11. introduction into the wild.
- 12. Section III: This legislation shall take effect immediately after being passed by this legislature.
- 13. Section IV: The DOI and the United States Department of Justice enforce this bill. The cloning of
- 14. critically endangered animals shall be funded by private organizations with subsidies of fifteen (15)
- 15. percent of the final cost shall be issued per every one hundred (100) critically endangered species that
- 16. is successfully cloned and survives for a period of at least one (1) year. Punishment for violating
- 17. any part of this bill will result in a minimum of five (5) years in prison and may extend upwards of
- 18. fifty (50) years depending on the severity of the infraction.
- 19. Section V: All other laws contradicting this piece of legislature are hereby null and void.
