A Bill to Legalize Marijuana

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: All marijuana products in the United States will be legal for medicinal and
- 3. recreational use for all eligible beings.
- 4. Section II: Marijuana shall be defined as any drug that comes from the hemp plant cannabis
- 5. sativa and has the active ingredient of tetrahydrocannabinol (THC). An eligible being shall be
- 6. defined as any American citizen over the age of 25.
- 7. Section III: This bill will take effect on January 1, 2020
- 8. Section IV: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services shall assume responsibility of
- 9. regulation for this bill. The bill will be funded by a \$0.67 per ounce tax. Failure of any state to
- 10. comply with the bill will result in a \$1,000,000 fine for the first attempt and a \$5,000,000 fine for a
- 11. repeated attempt, along with dropping any charges to do with the drug from the offendant, if any
- 12. charges were placed, for all attempts.
- 13. Section V: All laws or portions of laws in conflict with the provisions of this legislation shall
- 14. hereby be declared null and void.

A Bill to Initiate a National Basic Income

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: Every citizen above the age of 18 with an income at or below 50,000
- 3. annually shall receive a basic income of \$1000 every month. This bill would

- 15. welfare funds for this purpose and altering the capital gain tax brackets to
- 16. replicate the current progressive tax brackets. The increased money from the
- 17. change in capital gains taxes will go to the funding of this bill. Any government
- 18. entity or private citizen found to be violating this bill will receive a \$300,000 fine
- 19. for each incident.
- 20. Section V: All laws and portions of laws found to be in conflict with the provisions
- 21. of this bill are hereby declared null and void.

Bill to Prohibit Civil Forfeiture

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that;
- 2. Section I: The United States Government is to prohibit civil forfeiture nationwide.

Bill to Establish National Honor Point Standards

Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:

- 1. Section I: All American high schools shall adopt honor point standards for GPA and
- 2. report GPAs on a 4.0 scale.
- 3. Section II: American high schools include all private and public institutions with
- 4. students of grades 9-12. An honor point will be defined as an increase of one letter
- 5. grade to any grade achieved in an Advanced Placement class. For example, in the case of
- 6. a six-class schedule of two AP classes and 4 regular classes, a student with all As will

- 13. Section V: All laws, bills, acts, or precedents in conflict with any section or clause of
- 14. this bill shall be rendered null and void.

Bill to Completely Eliminate Power of Super PACS

- 1. Be it enacted by this Student Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: The ability of Super PACs to donate to any political candidate during any
- 3. type of political election, whether local, federal, or state level, be completely
- 4. eliminated.
- 5. Section II: A Super PAC (Political Action Committee) is a committee that legally may
