## **Bill to Promote Self-Driving Cars**

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: Car manufacturers will be required to create self-driving cars instead of
- 3. non-autonomous cars.
- 4. Section II: A self-driving car is defined as a vehicle that is capable of sensing its
- 5. environment and navigating without human input. This car will drive by itself, but
- 6. human intervention is possible in emergencies. A non-autonomous car will be defined as
- 7. a vehicle that requires human input to function. This bill ignores non-autonomous
- 8. vehicles that are not passenger vehicles; for example, mass transport vehicles (such as
- 9. school buses) and emergency vehicles.
- 10. **Section III:** This bill will take effect on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2035.
- 11. Section IV: Any funding necessary shall be provided by the United States Department of
- 12. Transportation. Enforcement of this bill shall be done by State government. Any violator
- 13. of this bill will be subject to a \$10,000 fine. The next fine will increase by \$100,000 and
- 14. each repeated offense will increase by \$100,000.
- 15. Section V: All laws conflicting with this legislation shall be held null and void.

### Driver's License Renewal Act

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: No person over the age of 65 shall renew their driver's license without retaking the
- 3. state road test.
- 4. Section II: A Road Test shall be defined as the examination of the driver's ability to safely
- 5. operate and maneuver a vehicle in traffic. The state road test may be administered by The
- 6. Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) or a licensed third party tester (TPT). The applicant
- 7. must successfully complete the road skills test to renew their license. Failure to successfully
- 8. pass the road skills test will result in a 10 hour completion of Driving School.
- 9. Section III: This bill shall be implemented on January 1st, 2017.
- 10. Section IV: The Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) shall take responsibility for the
- 11.implementation and enforcement of this bill. Violation after this bill is passed will result in an
- 12. initial \$500 fine from the violator. A second violation will result in license
- 13. suspension and a mandatory 10 hour completion of Driving School. This bill does not require
- 14. funding.
- 15. Section V: All laws and portions of laws found to be in conflict with the provisions of this
- 16. bill are hereby be declared null and void.

## A Bill to Ban Birthright Citizenship

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: Any person born in the United States will not be considered, subject to the
- 3. jurisdiction of the United States within the meaning of the 14th Amendment language, a
- 4. citizen unless at least one of his or her parents is, within nine or so months previous to his
- 5. or her birth, a citizen or legal resident of the United States.
- 6. Section II: All children born in the United States of undocumented immigrants shall no
- 7. longer receive citizenship in the United States. All those who gain citizenship under
- 8. birthright prior to implication of this bill are allowed to keep their citizenship.
- 9. Section III: The Department of Immigration and Naturalization shall be responsible for
- 10. the enforcement of this bill. There is no funding required for this bill as it only clarifies the
- 11. language of what a citizen is.
- 12. Section IV: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
- 13. Section V: This bill shall take effect January 1, 2017

# A Bill to Increase Teachers' Salaries



- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: Teachers of all primary and secondary schools in the United States will receive an
- 3. additional \$7,000 added to their salaries for every 10 years they teach after the implementation
- 4. of this bill.
- 5. Section II: A school shall be defined as any educational system (public and private) for
- 6. primary and secondary students. A teacher shall be defined as any employed worker under an
- 7. educational system who has the required state certifications and licenses. Certifications and licenses
- 8. may differ between teachers in public and private schools, but anyone defined as a teacher must have a
- 9. National Board of Certification. Failure to renew licenses will result in the restart of the 10 year count.
- 10. Teachers who move between educational systems will be allowed to carry the number of years from
- 11. the previous school they have worked at towards the 10 year count.
- 12. **Section III**: This bill shall be implemented on January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017.
- 13. Section IV: The National Board of Education in cooperation with all educational systems
- 14. throughout the United States will enforce and implement this bill. Any educational system in
- 15. violation with this bill will be charged \$1,500 per unpaid teacher. Funding will come from a
- 16. 0.01% increase on federal taxes.
- 17. Section V: All laws or portions of laws in conflict with the provisions of this bill will be
- 18. declared null and void.

## A Bill To Allow The Death Penalty Nationwide

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: The Department of Justice shall oversee that the death penalty is a
- **3.** nationwide legal option to try an adult defendant for.
- **4. Section II:** All states must accept this punishment as a viable option.
- **5. Section III:** The death penalty shall be described as a government
- **6.** sanctioned practice whereby a person is put to death by the state as a
- 7. punishment for a crime.
- **8. Section IV:** An adult is considered any person over the age of 18.
- 9. Section V: The penalty may only be presented as an option if a defendant is
- 10. found guilty first. Then this punishment may be suggested in the court.
- 11. Section VI: The death penalty will be carried out as lethal injection,
- 12.electrocution, gas chamber, firing squad, or hanging.
- 13. Section VII: All other laws conflicting with or pertaining to this law shall
- 14. now be considered null and void.
- **15.Section VIII:** This bill shall take effect January 1, 2017.

# A Bill To Ban Tobacco Products

### BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS THAT:

- 1 Section 1: All tobacco products are officially banned from being used in the
- 2 United States of America
- 3 Section 2: The tobacco products that are verified by the FDA and that are listed
- 4 on their website are the products that shall be prohibited in the United States.
- 5 **Section 3:** State Health Departments shall do surprise mandatory weekly
- 6 inspections on former tobacco companies to make sure the sell of tobacco
- 7 products is prohibited and if any tobacco products are found shall report to a
- 8 police officer.
- 9 Section 4: If a citizen of the U.S is caught using any of the previously mentioned
- 10 tobacco products, the penalty is that they will be forced to pay \$1,000 in fines
- 11 or up to 6 months in imprisonment.
- 12 Section 5: State governments shall pay for the weekly inspections by the State
- 13 Health departments.
- 14 **Section 6**: This bill will be implemented January 1 2020.
- 15 **Section 7:** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and 16 void.

# A Bill to Place a Tax On Sugar-Sweetened Beverages

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: A penny-per-ounce tax is to be placed on all sugar-sweetened beverages.
- 3. Section II: Sugar-sweetened drinks are to be defined as any soft drinks, fruit drinks,
- 4. sports drinks, tea and coffee drinks, energy drinks, sweetened milk or milk
- 5. alternatives, and any other beverage in which sugars like high fructose corn
- 6. syrup and sucrose are added. Sugar is to be defined as any artificial sweetener such as
- 7. neotame and aspartame.
- 8. A penny-per-ounce tax is to be defined as a cent increase in total price for every ounce
- 9. present in sugar-sweetened beverage.
- 10. All revenue from added tax shall go to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.
- 11. Section III: This legislation shall take effect six months after passage by this legislative
- 12. body.
- 13. Section IV: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services shall assume
- 14. responsibility of regulation for this bill. This bill requires no additional funding in order to
- 15.function. Failure of stores to place new tax on sugar-sweetened beverages will be in
- 16. violation of the law and shall be penalized in accordance with current tax laws.
- 17. Section V: All current laws or regulations in conflict with this legislation will be declared null
- 18. and void.

## A Bill To Ban Plastic Bags

- 1. Be it enacted by this Student Congress here assembled:
- 2. Section I: The United States Government shall ban the use of plastic bags in any publicly
- 3. owned store.
- 4. Section II: Any and all stores must provide only paper and reusable bags to customers.
- 5. Plastic bags shall be defined as polyethylene.
- 6. Section III: The state in which you live shall enforce the ban of plastic bags. Any store
- 7. who participates in the use of plastic bags shall receive a \$250 fine.
- 8. Section IV: All other laws conflicting with or pertaining to this law are now null and
- 9. void.
- 10. Section V: This legislation will be implemented on July 1, 2019.
