Connect America Act

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: All current railroad tracks are hereby publicly acquired. Current railways that connect
- 3. major cities within each region of the U.S. will be upgraded to high speed rails (HSR). Upon
- 4. completion, at least one (1) HSR will be developed to connect regions.
- 5. Section II: Just compensation will be given to railroad companies. Private freight trains will still
- 6. be allowed to operate on public rail lines for a fee no greater than the cost of rail maintenance.
- 7. Priority will always be given to Amtrak trains. HSR shall be defined as track that can support
- 8. trains traveling at speeds of at least one hundred twenty (120) miles per hour. Regions and the
- 9. states inside them shall be decided by the Federal Railroad Administration. There will be no
- 10. interstate rail connections to Alaska or Hawaii.
- 11. Section III: The Federal Railroad Administration and the Department of Transportation shall be
- 12. in charge of executing this bill. Federal grants will match state developed railroads at a rate of
- 13. eight (8) federal dollars to one (1) state dollar. 300 billion dollars shall be provided to pay for new
- 14. and upgraded tracks, as well as federal grants regarding railroads. Train tickets will be subsidised
- 15. at a rate of forty (40) percent. These costs shall be paid for by a ten (10) percent tax on all
- 16. domestic passenger flights and imported cars. Any further costs will be covered by bonds which
- 17. shall be repaid by revenue from Amtrak tickets, after which no profits shall be made by Amtrak.
- 18. Section IV: All laws in conflict with this legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.
- 19. Section V: This legislation shall take effect on January 1, 2020. Construction deadlines shall be
- 20. set by the Department of Transportation and shall be no later than December 31, 2040.

Bill to Higher the Smoking Age

Bill to Limit Class Size

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress assembled here:
- 2. Section I: Class size shall be limited in public schools.
- 3. Section II: A class shall be defined as a room in a public school where students gather to
- 4. receive at least 30 minutes of instruction by a certified teacher. Public schools shall be
- 5. defined as a school supported by public funds.
- 6. Section III: The size of classes in kindergarten through grade 3 shall be limited to 15
- 7. students per teacher. In grades 4 and 5 class size shall not exceed 20 students per teacher.
- 8. Class size for grades 6 through 12 shall not exceed 25 students.
- 9. Section IV: The Michigan Department of Education will be responsible for the
- 10. enforcement of this bill. Any violation of this bill will result in a 5% decrease in funding
- 11. to the violating school from the state of Michigan until compliance occurs. Any necessary
- 12. funding for this bill will come from a \$1 tax excise increase per 12 ounce drink for beer,
- 13. 5 ounce drink for wine, and 1.5 ounce drink for spirits.
- 14. Section V: Any and all laws or portions of the law in conflict of this bill are hereby
- 15. declared null and void.
- 16. Section VI: This bill will be implemented on July 1, 2023.

Bill to Require Uniforms in Public Schools

- 1. Be it enacted by this Congress here assembled that:
- 2. Section I: This bill shall require that all public schools require a common uniform.
- 3. Section II: Dress codes decided upon previously by the schools will still apply to the
- 4. uniforms, however can be adjusted based on the uniform. Males, will be required to wear
- 5. a school uniform collared shirt (tucked in), and black or navy dress pants. Females will
- 6. be required to wear a school uniform collared shirt (tucked in). As well as leggings, black
- 7. or navy dress pants, or a uniform skirt reaching just above the knee or lower, worn over
- 8. black leggings. All students will also be given the option of wearing a V neck uniform
- 9. sweatshirt over the collared shirt which must be tucked, and fully buttoned (or with top
- 10. button unbuttoned). The gender in this bill will be be determined through biology, except
- 11. in the case of transgender male or females, in which case they will be considered the
- 12. gender they choose. Black formal shoes are required amongst all students.
- 13. Section III: All uniforms will be provided by the school of no charge to the student. Any
- 14. additional uniform parts will cost a fee to be paid to the school. Additional uniform
- 15. parts will be defined as a uniform V neck collar sweatshirt. Students may wear any form
- 16. of coat, hoodie, or sweatshirt over their uniform off of school premises, but on school
- 17. premises the uniform must be completely visible.
- 18. Section IV: This bill will be enforced by the U.S. Department of Education. The
- 19. punishment for a student who resists to comply will vary: first offense is call home,
- 20. second and third offense is detention, and the fourth offense will result in an immediate
- 21. suspension from the school over an amount of time the school board sees fit. Any schools
- 22. that refuse to comply will be fined by \$10,000 as well as an additional \$300 per month of
- 23. not cooperating. 0.001% of the U.S. Military budget will be used to fund this bill.
- 24. Section V: All other laws conflicting with this bill are hereby declared null and void.
- 25. Section VI: This bill will be implemented on July 25, 2020.

- 2. Section I: The use of solitary confinement in United States prisons shall
- 3. be banned.
- 4. Section II: Solitary confinement shall be defined as the isolation of an inmate in
- 5. an individual cell that minimizes human contact for 2 days or more.
- 6. Section III: The Department of Justice will execute this bill along with all
- 7. subsequent responsibilities. The renovation of prisons to comply with this bill will

- 16. fines will be imposed per this bill.
