

Determine if the listed source is a Primary Source (P) or a Secondary Source (S).

Primary Sources: Materials that were created at the time the event occurred, or materials created by those who experienced the event. These materials include letters, speeches, diaries, newspaper articles from the time period (by a reporter who was there first-hand), interviews with people who were around when the event occurred, documents, photographs, and articles such as tools, weapons, clothing from the time period.

Secondary Sources: Materials that were created after the event. These materials might tell you about an event, person, time, or place, but they were created by someone who was not a direct participant or witness. Secondary sources can include history books, school textbooks, encyclopedias, magazines, websites, and documentaries.
