"Please wait. I call my daughter," Pai was saying. He was talking to someone, someone in the house. Who could it be?


"Oh, Ediiite!"

I stared at her without a word. My stomach turned over, 14


"What did she say?" Pai wanted to know.

Pai's face hardened some.


"Tell her she's wasting her time. We're not giving them to her. Didn't you already tell her that on the telephone?"

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

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Mãe looked at her again and smiled, but I could tell she was a little **worried**.


We stood there in kind of a funny circle; the lady looked at each of us **in turn** and took a deep breath.

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
Summarize paragraphs 41 and 42 in writing. "I already said what I had to say. The dishes are ours. That is all."
