

3,2,1 READING EXIT SLIPS

Use the following exit slips to provide a quick way to see if your students are comprehending what they are reading. This strategy is perfect for adjusting your instruction for the next day and it will also help your students by providing them with a fast and easy way to think about what they have learned. You can use this with informational text or literature.

Front side of exit slip: Students will write 3 things they learned, 2 new words they discovered and 1 remaining question.

Back side of exit slip: You can ask students a specific question OR choose from the list of questions provided.
