World Religions Introduction

Religion is a unified set of beliefs and practices that is centered around what is sacred or important.

- Many religions include the worship of a god or multiple gods
 - One god=*monotheistic*, multiple gods=*polytheistic*
- All religions teach a set of practices to live morally (be good people)
- Many religions provide an explanation for:
 - How the world/human society began
 - What happens after death

You will be working with a group to become an expert on a World Religion. This may be a religion you know about or practice, but it may be something completely new to you!

Goal: Identify and describe the beliefs of the six major world religions.



To show what you have learned, you will be giving a presentation to your classmates.

World Religions Requirements (Content)

Both you and your partner need to complete notes on your religion

- a. State how it began: Who, when, and where
- b. Describe the holy book/text
- c. Explain what power they believed in: God, Gods, etc.
- d. Explain what this religion teaches about the afterlife.



- e. Explain other beliefs people of this religion have including how people should should behave morally
- f. Explain at least one major holiday and its significance
- g. Explain the challenges has this religion faced in the past / present
- Explain what this religion looks like today: How many people practice it and where are they?
 What are their houses of worship?

World Religions Requirements (Presentation)

Your group will be creating a slideshow to use with your presentation to show your religion to others.

- 1. All content must be included
- 2. Title
- 3. Pictures / symbols
- 4. Color and decoration
- 5. Correct spelling and grammar
- 6. A physical artifact

You will be presenting this to your classmates - we need to be able to learn from it!
