

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TEACHER GUIDE

This is a versatile tool that can be used in a variety of situations when teaching students about the Civil Rights Movement. Firstly, I typically use this resource as an introductory activity to a Civil Rights unit of study. I do not tell students that we will be learning about the Civil Rights and instead present them with the photo analysis found in this resource so students can practice their ability to analyze a source without first being given context clues. That is why none of the included photos include captions or title. Instead, the students are encouraged to use the content of the image (facilitated by the included analysis chart) to interpret the photos in order to create their own meaning. Alternatively, the differing photo's in this resource can be used at different times during the unit of study when then image corresponds to the topic being taught. For example, photo #1 could be used while learning about the sit-ins.

There are also several different ways this resource can be utilized. First, the class could be divided into five groups and each group could be responsible for analyzing and interpreting a different photo. They could then be tasked with presenting their findings back to the rest of the class. Secondly, the different photos could be distributed throughout the class at different "stations" and students could be required to visit each station in order to analyze each of the five photos. A class discussion could be used as a concluding activity. Third, each student could be required to analyze each photo (or a selection of photos) individually. Based on teacher discretion, the teacher could add photos or remove photos from the resource in order to better meet the needs of the students in the classroom.

The included photos are a general cross-section of the Civil Rights Movement and by the end of the use of the resource, the students should have improved skills at photo analysis and have a general understanding of the major themes of the Civil Rights Movement upon which the teacher can begin exploring specific topics in more detail.

The included photo analysis chart should be completed by students recording their observations (what they see in the images) to the 5 W's on each chart and then offering an interpretation of the each of the questions. Finally, students should conclude by offering an overall interpretation of what the photo represents.

General teacher keys are included for each photo, and a PowerPoint has been included that contains each image so that the teacher may use to facilitate a class discussion if needed. The class discussions should center on students offering their observations and interpretations of the included photos with the teacher simply facilitating or guiding the discussion.

The teacher should fill in the gaps of the student's interpretation afterwards to assist in analysis and help students see how effective they were with their interpretations. The included teacher keys are a general guide for interpretation of the images.

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	OBSERVATIONS	INTERPRETATIONS
WHO is in the image?	There are people sitting at a counter (two of which are the only African Americans in the image) and other people standing (all white) people the people at the counter.	The people at the counter are likely doing something that the others (behind them) don't want them to do. Since the only two African Americans are being abused the image may be showing racial issues.
WHAT are the people doing in the image?	The people at the counter are sitting still and are being abused or heckled by the people behind them. The people behind are pouring things on the others sitting at the counter.	Either the people at the counter are scared and don't want to leave or they are standing up for something. Otherwise they would leave. The others are angry and trying to shame the ones sitting at the counter.
WHERE does the image take place?	The image appears to take place in a restaurant or a diner as evidenced by the counter the people are sitting at. The counter contains salt and pepper suggesting it's a restaurant.	Likely taking place in the USA or a similar Western Democracy based on the presence of African Americans and white people. Maybe in a restaurant in the American South.
WHEN did the action take place?	The image appears to be older based on the clothing, hair styles and other features of the people present. As well, the image is black and white suggesting it was created before color imagery.	Based on the evidence of the hair styles and clothing and the use of black and white imagery the image was likely taken in the 1940's to 1960's.
WHY is the action happening?	The people at the counter appear sad or frightened while the others in the back seem happy based on the fact that some are smiling.	The people abusing the others at the counter are trying to shame or embarrass them.

Overall Summary:

The image seems to be from the 1940's-1960's in the American South and displays issues related to race or equality. The people at the counter are being shamed for doing something they shouldn't be doing or aren't supposed to do.

	OBSERVATIONS	INTERPRETATIONS
WHO is in the image?	There are soldiers and African American men with signs on their chests.	The African American men are likely members of an organization that supports rights of some kind and the soldiers are present to stop or prevent violence.
WHAT are the people doing in the image?	The African American men are walking in a single file line with signs on their chests. The army soldier are aiming their guns in the direction of the African American men and holding a line.	The African American men appear to be protesting for equal rights based on the nature of the signs. The soldiers appear to be directing the direction of the African American men.
WHERE does the image take place?	On a street corner where tanks or other military related vehicles appear to be driving by.	Based on the presence of African American men and the English signs, the street is likely in the USA.
WHEN did the action take place?	The guns, helmets and military vehicles are not modern. The clothing appears to be from an older style and the image is black and white.	Based on the older style weapons and gear the action likely took place in the 1940's to 1960's.
WHY is the action happening?	The African American men have signs that read "I am a Man" and are walking in a line. The soldiers seem to be directing the African American men.	The African American men are protesting or standing up for equal rights of some kind. The presence of the soldiers suggests that the government expects some kind of violence or riots.

The African American girl is surrounded by many people. The soldiers are watching on in concern. WHEN did the action take place?	The clothing and styling of the people is older and the image is black and white.	In the 1940's-1960's.
