A Group of Michigan Citizens Protest Staying at Home in "Operation Gridlock"

On April 1st, there was a protest in Lansing, Michigan's capitol. Thousands of people came to the state capitol to protest Governor Gretch Whitmer's stay at home order because they feel like it takes away their freedom. The protestors blocked the streets with their cars, and many of them got out of their cars even though their leaders told them not to. They walked the streets and waved flags, shouting, "Open up Michigan!" This protest was called "Operation Gridlock."

Governor Gretchen Whitmer spoke about the protest. She said she was "really disappointed" to see people congregating outside and not wearing masks during Operation Gridlock. "We know this protest endangered people, put more people at risk of catching COVID-19 and could prolong how long we all need to stay at home.
