Laws:

- Are important in a community because they keep people safe.
 - o examples: **stopping at a red light**, going the speed limit

Local Governments:

- provide services for its citizens
 - examples: schools, parks, police department
- help its citizens:
 - examples: picking up trash, fixing traffic lights, repaving the roads
- are organized into what we call **<u>the 3 branches:</u>**
 - The mayor enforces the laws.
 - The court interprets the laws and must decide what a law means.
 - The city council makes the laws.
- Types of Action:
 - <u>Government action</u>: Things a government or people working for a government do.
 - Example: **putting up a street light**
 - **<u>Private action</u>**: Things a private person does.
 - Example: taking out your garbage

Core Democratic Values:

- The Common Good: People working together for the benefit of everyobody
 - Example: Local laws that limit the speed of a city street protect the common good; Someone cutting their grass so the community will look nice is a decision for the common good.
- Individual Rights: Something that people are entitled to have or do.
 - Example: The right to speak freely, practice your own religion

Diversity:

- means that everyone is different.
- Diversity is seen in differences in: foods, languages, religions, traditions
 - Example: <u>People celebrate different holidays including Kwanzaa, Christmas, and</u> <u>Hanukka. This shows diversity.</u>

Patriotism:

- We show patriotism in many ways.
 - When you **say the Pledge of Allegiance**, it means that **you promise to be loyal to the ideals of the United States**.
- We have important symbols for our country.
 - o Example: American flag

Roles and Responsibilities of **Citizens (an individual member of a community)**:

- Civic responsibility Things members of a community are supposed to do.
 - Example: **<u>2nd graders cleaning up trash in a local park</u>**
- Personal responsibility Things individual people are supposed to do.
 - Example: <u>cleaning your bedroom</u>
- Making decisions A fair way for a group of people to make a decision is to <u>take a vote</u>.
