


Andrew Jackson Fun Facts

- 7th president of the United States
- First president born in a log cabin
- Born to poverty in South Carolina
- Man of the people
- Native American fighter
- Bar room brawler
- Duelist with 2 bullets in his body
- Left office with zero debt

- Forever changed the role of the president
- Slave owner
- Hero of New Orleans
- Almost assassinated
- Nearly beat his would be assinator to death
- Join the army at 13 to fight in the Revolutionary War


The Election of 1828:

- Between Andrew <u>Jackson</u> and John <u>Quincy Adams</u>
- First <u>dirty</u> campaign (<u>mudslinging</u>)
 - Adams accused Jackson's wife of adultery
 - Jackson accused Adams of being an aristocrat who broke the sabbath by gambling



Election of 1828 Continued:

- Jackson wins <u>178 -- 83</u>
- First <u>Democrat</u> to be elected president
- First "Man of the <u>People</u>" Elected



The Spoils System

"To the Victor go the Spoils"

- First introduced during Jackson's presidency
- Says that the president has the <u>power</u> to give government <u>jobs</u> to his <u>supporters</u> after the winning of an election
- Also allowed to <u>fire</u> these workers if they do not <u>support</u> the president
- Andrew Jackson <u>fired</u> his <u>competitors</u> and <u>hired</u> his <u>friends</u>
- Also fired many <u>cabinet members</u> (13 in all)




The Nullification Crisis

The <u>Tariff Acts</u> of 1828 and 1832 were designed to help <u>northern</u> industry by <u>taxing foreign</u> goods brought into the country


The Tariffs <u>helped</u> business in the <u>North</u> and <u>hurt</u> business in the

South




Nullification Crisis Cont.....

- South Carolina said it had the right to "Nullify" (say no to) the Tariff Acts
- Jackson says <u>NO YOU DON'T!!!</u>
- South Carolina threatened to <u>secede</u> (leave) from the USA
- Jackson promised to <u>march</u> down to SC with <u>troops</u> and <u>hang</u> its leaders if they left
- A new tariff act was passed and a compromise was reached



The War with the Bank

- Jackson says the Second <u>National</u>
 <u>Bank</u> of the U.S. has <u>too much</u>
 <u>power</u>
- The National Bank was up for recharter in 1832
- Jackson <u>vetoed</u> the bank's charter
- Basically tells the National Bank "You can <u>no longer</u> be in <u>charge</u> of the U.S.A.'s money"



The Bank War Cont....

- He put the money from the nation banks in <u>smaller banks</u>
- He <u>sold land</u> in the <u>west</u> to settlers and put that money in smaller banks
- Jackson <u>pays off</u> the National Debt
- Only president ever to leave office with <u>zero</u> debt




Indian Removal Act of 1830

- Native Americans and Americans have had <u>disputes</u> for <u>hundreds</u> of years
- In 1830 Jackson signed a bill that <u>forced all Native</u> <u>American</u> tribes to move <u>west</u> of the Mississippi River to a desert in the land that is now <u>Oklahoma</u>




Indian Removal Act of 1830 cont....

- Cherokees, Creeks, Chickasaws, Choctaws and Seminoles were the major tribes forced to moved
- <u>Cherokees</u> took their fight to stay in their lands to the <u>Supreme Court</u> and <u>won</u>
- Jackson <u>ignored</u> the Supreme Court's decision and <u>enforced</u> the law anyway



The Trail of Tears

- Native Americans were <u>forced</u> at <u>gunpoint</u> to move <u>west</u> of the Mississippi River
- Could only bring what they <u>could carry</u> with them
- Had to <u>walk</u> the entire way with <u>little</u> <u>provisions</u> (aprox 2,200 miles)
- About <u>1</u> out of every <u>4</u> Native Americans forced to move <u>died</u> along the way
- Most were young <u>children</u> and the <u>elderly</u>
