TEACHER INSTRUCTIONS

This activity is ideal for the beginning of the year or beginning of the course. It is an ideal way of introducing topics such as the meaning of history, evidence, primary and secondary sources, perspectives, contextulization, etc.

- 1. Have the desks previously numbered before the students come in. Have Pages 1 & 2 printed double sided & numbered, so that students do not get the same worksheet as their desk number.
- 2. Have the students leave the room, bringing only a writing utensil and something to write on (binder, notebook, etc)
- 3. Outside the room, students are given a worksheet with two desk numbers that are not their own. Instructions are explained to the students.
- 4. Students are to walk into the classroom and examine the room and the two assigned desks. In the columns, they are to write what they OBSERVED (no touching) on the chart.
- 5. Once done observing, the students are to draw conclusions about the people sitting at the desks and about the teacher, filling out the chart on the back.
- 6. After (x) time, students will be stopped. Students will be paired with with the other person who observed the same desk
 - Compare notes, observations on the Desk & Classroom
 - Switch, to second desk
 - ***Note*** Create a list before hand, dividing the number of desks into two groups. Use this list when putting the numbers on the chart, so that when it comes time to pair, there is less confusion.
- 7. Once everyone is done, students are to go back to their seats. They are to be given and Complete Part 2 (Page 3). This is where the students begin to connect their knowledge from the activity to the key ideas from the lesson.
- 8. Conduct a classroom discussion.
 - 1. Discuss Observations made about the classroom? (objects, colors, etc)
 - 2. What conclusions about me as a teacher? (Do not do the students... could get ugly)
 - 3. Discuss Worksheet Answers
- 9. Lead into a conversation/notes about the key historical ideas intended for the lesson.
